
Commentary on the Gospel for Wed, Aug 12th 2015

For 40 years Moses led his people away from attacks by the Egyptians and through every sort of natural disaster to be found in the dessert, all the while, trying to keep them in a right relationship with their God. Though Moses did not set foot into the promised land, God rewarded him for his steady allegiance and trust by taking him to the top of Mt.
