

## **Commentary on the Gospel for Wed, Dec 16th 2015**

If I were singing Mass today, I would sing Fr. John Foley's song "Turn to Me." I've been singing it in my head and around the house as I've been trying to write this reflection on Isaiah. "Turn to me, oh turn and be saved says the Lord for I am God. There is no other, none beside me, I call your name." There is one God, who created the heavens and the earth and everything in them.
