Readings: Feast of the Baptism of the Lord

First Reading: Is 42:1-4,6-7

Thus says the LORD:

Here is my servant whom I uphold,
my chosen one with whom I an pleased,
upon whom I have put my spirit,
be shall bring forth justice to the nations,
not crying out, not shotting,
not making his voice heard in the street.
a brused reed he shall not break,
and a smoldering wick he shall not quench,
until he establishes justice on the earth;
the coastlands will wait for his teaching.

Gospel Introduction: This Is My Beloved Son

Jesus' baptism in the Jordan is the occasion to make him known as the promised Savior: the Father calls him his beloved Son; the Holy Spirit will guide him.

Gospel Reading: Mt 3:3-17

Jesus came from Galilee to John at the Jordan

to be baptized by him.

John tried to prevent him, saying,

"I need to be baptized by you,
and yet you are coming to me?"
Jesus said to him in reply,
"Allow in now, for thus it is fitting for us
to fulfall all righteousness."

Then he allowed him.

After Jesus was baptized,
he came up from the water and behold,
the heavens were opened for him,
and he saw the Spaire of God descending like a dove
and coming upon him.

And a voice came from the heavens, saying,
